



By the end of Q3 (2014), increase the engagement of system partners across the healthcare settings to the goals of the SWRWCP via the implementation of a 'Communication and Engagement Strategy' to advocate for standardized evidence-informed wound care practice and smooth efficient transitions of care across healthcare sectors in the South West LHIN.
PRIMARY DRIVER

Short term outcomes

By the end of 2014/15 Q4 (2015), develop standardized evidence-informed skin and wound care tools/resources, posted centrally on the SWRWCP website and increase the number of Wound Care Champions who have a minimum level of SWRWCP-Canadian Association of Wound Care certification (or equivalent) within each healthcare sector to promote and implement such resources across the South West LHIN.
SECONDARY DRIVER

Intermediate outcomes

By the end of 2014/15 Q1 (June 2014), facilitate cross - sectoral system integration via the implementation of a cross-sector partnering governance/accountability model to improve collaboration in reducing the incidence of wounds in the South West LHIN via standardized evidence-informed prevention strategies.
